Review of the Online Talks and Presentations

So far this year, we've had three Zoom presentations on a diverse range of subjects from Plants and Habitats through to the environmental impact of our equipment choices.

This Newsletter will look at the first three of these Online Talks and Presentations and give you a flavour of the content and, also, links to where you can find videos of the Online Talks and Presentations, so you can watch them at your leisure.

Jim talking about Habitats and Plants

The first was with Jim Langley from <u>Nature's Work</u>, telling us more about the different habitats and the plants we might find while out on some of our camping trips. These range from the high mountains down to sea level.

Jim is a director of Nature's Work, one of the UK's leading outdoor education and environmental education training consultancies. Based in North Wales, Jim has over twenty-five years' experience of guiding people in the outdoors and holds the International Mountain Leader award.





Jim's talk was a trip around Britain's main rural habitats, illustrated with lovely photographs, and he demonstrated his huge knowledge of the subject. Not only telling us the names and types of plants, but also telling us a little bit about some of their history, their uses (in some cases both ancient and modern) and some of their unusual features, like relationships with ants.



The second talk took us into a completely different world, learning about the uses, design and physics of a stove which produces 'Bio Char' as a byproduct.

Graeme and Rachel, from <u>Carbon Farmers</u>, showed us not only how the stove works, but also gave us an insight into how to cook on it, the flexibility and diversity of its four cooking areas and an understanding of how it is better for the environment, compared to normal campfire cooking.



The 'Tawi Stove' was invented by Graeme, building on experience from his early life in Kenya. It uses an incredibly small amount of wood, only needing what most of us would consider to be kindling to burn, it gets to cooking heat extremely quickly and provides four main cooking areas on the stove – the main cooking area, a heating plate, a warming area and a grill.

Pete talking about equipment and its environmental impact

The third talk in this year's series, was with Pete from <u>ProAdventure</u>, an independent outdoor shop in Llangollen, with a reputation for providing quality kit and professional advice. ProAdventure focus on providing some of the best, and most respected, outdoor brands and products by asking searching questions of their suppliers to seek out quality, long lasting products with the environment at the heart of design.



Pete showed us some of the equipment in the shop giving us a real flavour of the range that they carry, whilst giving important insights into the environmental impact of the different equipment. We were able to discuss the pros and cons of different materials, approaches to manufacture and distribution, and the kit itself.



Pete also gave us some thoughts for comparing "cheap and cheerful" with "expensive and long lasting", including how to rent or purchase gear on a return basis. This talk would prove extremely important to anybody wishing to consider the environmental impact of their actions through gear purchase.
